## **1980'S - 1995: MERCED'S FOUNDING**

#### In 1995, Merced Housing Texas was founded.

It began as a challenge from San Antonio Councilwoman and civic leader María Antonietta Berriozábal to San Antonio's congregations of Catholic sisters. In the late 1980s, Berriozábal charged them with collaborating to define and address the most crucial need in San Antonio. Affordable housing emerged as the most pressing one.

### **1997: CASITAS DE MERCED**

Casitas de Merced in Somerset, Texas, was the first major development of Merced Housing Texas and required a collaboration between three significant partners – the City of Somerset, the San Antonio Housing Trust, and Bexar County.



### **2000: SINGLE FAMILY PROGRAM**

In late 2000, a Trinity University professor and their friend wanted to save a house on San Antonio's East Side. They were willing to fund the rehabilitation but lacked the expertise to do the work. At that time, the City of San Antonio was set to demolish the house. The San Antonio Housing Trust loaned Merced funding to acquire the home. Merced rehabilitated the house and sold it to a family living on a low income and later reimbursed the professor and his friend for their initial investment.

> This became the inspiration and catalyst for Merced's Single-Family Program. Merced would rehab a home, sell it to first-time homebuyers living on low incomes, and then replace the San Antonio Housing Trust funds to repeat the process. When the program ended in 2015, twenty-one families had realized the dream of home ownership, twenty-one homes had been rescued from demolition, and twenty-one neighborhoods had been uplifted.

# 2002: SERVE OUR SENIORS & OWNER-OCCUPIED REPAIR PROGRAM

Ms. Rosa Mercado was a proud Army veteran. She occasionally hosted Denver Heights Community meetings on San Antonio's East Side. In 2002, former President Susan R. Sheeran attended a meeting in Ms. Mercado's home for the first time. Ms. Mercado was the most generous of hosts, and Sheeran became even more impressed with Ms. Mercado when she saw the challenges that the conditions of her house posed.

Sheeran offered to investigate whether Merced could help repair her home. With an initial \$5,000 grant from the Dave Coy Foundation of the Bank of America and

donations of materials and labor from Encore Property Management and others, Merced made extensive repairs to Ms. Mercado's home. "And one thing led to another," Sheeran said. "But then I realized that this was just a drop of water in a big, huge ocean of need." The Serve Our Seniors (SOS) Emergency Repair Program was born.

### **2001-2008: LOS VECINOS**

In 1998, homeowners living in the Mission Espada neighborhood had no water or sewer service. They were using outhouses and cesspool systems.





Over the course of seven years from start to finish, neighborhood homeowners received water and sewer connections and the necessary rehab of their homes.








### **2003: STABLEWOOD FARMS**

Finished in 2003, Stablewood Farms Apartments was the first large apartment development Merced undertook. Like several Merced communities, part of its financing was from the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Today, Merced owns or has developed 14 affordable housing communities across seven Texas cities.

# 2019: THE 800 AT BELLSHIRE APARTMENTS REHABILITATION

The 800 at Bellshire Apartments has transformed from the development Merced acquired in 2001 to a virtually new apartment community. In 2001, Merced greatly extended its reach by purchasing The 800 at Bellshire Apartments in Conroe, Texas.

Damage from Hurricane Ike in 2008 and two fires in 2015 had Merced struggling to make necessary repairs. Merced applied to the Houston-Galveston Area Council for a \$50,000 loan. Instead, Merced was awarded a 10-year forgivable loan of \$16.5 million. "We were stunned," said Kristin Davila, Merced's President & Executive Director, "It was a miracle. The property couldn't sustain more debt to make the repairs."

### **2005: HURRICANE KATRINA SUPPORT**

In the wake of Hurricane Katrina, Merced housed 168 families who had evacuated from New Orleans at its San Antonio affordable housing communities. Merced's Resident Services Program was a critical support for them.



One new resident, Obie, began her journey to San Antonio by evacuating New Orleans with her aging mother and 13 year old daughter to avoid the destruction the city would face with Hurricane Katrina.

"I came here and meet the staff and Susan and I remember asking Susan for a job," says Obie. "With the help of Alamo Work Source, I got a job here! I was so happy because now I could get a bigger place at Avion and start making a home."

## **2020: COVID-19 PANDEMIC SUPPORT**

In 2020, Merced strategically pivoted its programs to ensure uninterrupted service delivery to residents and homeowners during the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Through a collaboration with the Southwest School of Art, Merced was able to provide online art classes for youth living at Merced apartment communities.



One-on-one support was key to preventing social isolation and keeping residents connected to vital resources.





- Enrichment & Education











### **OWNER-OCCUPIED REPAIR PROGRAM**

As houses age and begin to deteriorate, financial hardship and limited income can create barriers to making the repairs necessary to prevent homes from falling into dangerous conditions.

The Owner-Occupied Repair Program (OORP) began in 2002 to make health, safety, and accessibility repairs for homeowners living on low incomes whose homes have significantly deteriorated to the point of becoming hazardous living environments. Repairs can include electrical, plumbing, ADA accessibility modifications, roofing, HVAC, foundation, and flooring.
